- Commitment
 - Perennials
 - Care and maintenance
- Space in the landscape
- USDA hardiness zone and chill hour requirements
- Use (fresh, canned, baking, etc.)
- Taste (sour or sweet)

Site Considerations

- Location is free from...
 - Frost pockets
 - Low/wet spots
 - Exposure to strong winds
- Sandy loam or sandy clay loam soil, well-draining soil
- General pH range 5.5 to 7.0
 - -6.0 to 6.5 is optimal
 - 4.5 to 5.5 for blueberries



Ordering Your Plants

- Purchase during fall or spring
 - Both in store and online
 - Summer clearance?
- Inspect for insects and diseases
- Inspect for shriveled roots
- 1-year old trees preferred
 - $-\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ " in diameter
 - 4 to 7 feet



Blueberries

Blueberries

- Rabbit-eye or southern highbush varieties
 - South highbush (SHB) is not well documented or researched in the state
 - Rabbite-eye is native to SE Virginia
 - Generally self-fertile, but cross-pollination produce larger fruit and higher yields
- Fruits on 1-year old wood
- Harvest from June to September


Caneberries: Blackberries and Raspberries

Caneberries

- Canes are biennial, crown is perennial
- Canes grow from the crown every year
- Thorn and thornless varieties
- Fruiting types
 - Primocanes fruit on new growth
 - Floricanes fruit on 2-year old wood
- Training and trellising is recommended

Primocanes


- Green, fleshy stalks
- Annual growth
- Produces fruit mid to late summer
- Proper pruning can produce another harvest the following year

Floricanes

- Woody, brown
- 2nd year cane produced by primocanes
- Fruits early to mid summer, then dies

Strawberries



- Two types
 - June-bearing (short-day)
 - Less than 14 hours of daylight
 - Ever-bearing (day-neutral)
- Fruiting for more than 2 years results in smaller berries and weaker plants
- Stolons are vigorous



Pest Management

Pests

- Practice Integrated Pest Management (IPM)
 - Scout
 - Prevention
 - Biologicals
 - Chemicals, if necessary
 - Dormant oils, all-in-one sprays
